Passed Senate State and Local Governmental Operations Committee	Gravley - 67th Strickland - 111th Meadows - 5th Coomer - 14th Powell -171st Williamson - 115th	Called the Fireman's Cancer/Insurance Bill http://www.legis.ga.gov/Legislation/20172018/167813.pdf	This is not linked with workers comp. It allows for insurance coverage for this select group. There must be a link between the cancer and the fire officials duties. This passed in the Senate on 3/09/17 and is moving to the Governor for his signature.

The media has indicated that the Governor expresses some concern about this bill and has asked that other events and locations be added to prohibited areas.

Senate Judiciary Committee	Jasperse - 11th Meadows - 5th Powell - 32nd Ballinger - 23rd Jones - 91st Clark - 147th	This is a very encompassing gun bill relating to weapons carry and weapons safety. http://www.legis.ga.gov/Legislation/20172018/167431.pdf	This bill needs to read carefully as it relates to many different issues. The most important appear to be FBI National Instant Criminal Background Check System, state reciprocity, involuntary hospitalization information going to GCIC and civil immunity for firearms instructors.

The modifications made the bill stronger and more acceptable. It looks like a good bill now. So far, this bill is on the fast track.

House Judiciary Non-Civil Committee	Watson - 1st Unterman - 45th Hufstetler - 52nd Millar - 40th Kirk - 13th Orrock - 36th	Reduces the percentage of the THC oil in the "Low THC oil patient registry" from 5% to 3%. This bill would also allow autism patients 18 years old or older to be added to the registry as well as patients 18 years old or less with severe autism. http://www.legis.ga.gov/Legislation/20172018/165616.pdf	The GACP is evaluating this bill, but it seems reasonable.

This bill did not make it out of the Senate and appears to be dead for this session.
SB 105	**	Senate Judiciary Committee	Jones - 22nd Parent - 42nd Fort - 39th Rhett - 33rd Davenport - 44th James - 35th	This bill changes the quantity of marijuana needed to constitute misdemeanor possession to two ounces of marijuana. This bill did not make it out of the Senate and appears to be dead for this session.

House Public Safety and Homeland Security Committee	Jones - 10th Henson - 41st Butler - 55th Davenport - 44th Parent - 42nd Anderson - 43rd	Provides for additional or special training requirements for School Resource Officers. At least 40 hours of POST approved training. http://www.legis.ga.gov/Legislation/20172018/167629.pdf	The bill was altered substantially and now GASSLEE is no longer opposed to the bill as it now stands. Author Emanuel Jones was very corporative and understanding to the needs of the school police.

House Judiciary Non-Civil Committee	Kirk - 13th Harper - 7th Shafer - 48th Cowsert - 46th Sims - 12th Miller - 49th	This bill provided for the offenses of aggravated assault and aggravated battery against a public safety employee while the employee is engaged in the performance of their duties. Additionally, it allows for torts of parents and guardians if a person under their control commits the above noted crimes. http://www.legis.ga.gov/Legislation/20172018/166680.pdf	The bill is very supportive of law enforcement. Major modification were made from the original version making it more acceptable.

House Govern- mental Affairs Committee	Kirk - 13th Harper – 7th Shafer - 48th Cowsert - 46th Parent - 42nd Gooch - 51st	This bill would create a Local Law Enforcement Officer Compensation Commission that will provide for an ongoing review of local officer salaries and benefits. http://www.legis.ga.gov/Legislation/20172018/166668.pdf	This is a study commission and GACP will have a member on the committee if the bill passes. During the Senate hearing, several committee members accented that cities and counties determine salaries of their employees however, a committee was needed to show what we all know; law enforcement in many areas of the state are underpaid.

SB 254	*	Senate Public Safety Commit- tee	Williams - 27th Kirk - 13th Mc Koon - 29th	This bill deals with the establishment of a minimum annual salary for each deputy appointed by each sheriff, to provide for cost-of-living and general performance based increases for each deputy appointed by each sheriff and to create the Local Law Enforcement Officer Compensation Commission. http://www.legis.ga.gov/Legislation/20172018/166440.pdf	This bill did not make it out of the Senate and appears to be dead for this session.
SR 182	**	Senate Public Safety Commit- tee	James - 35th Rhett - 33rd Orrock - 36th Lucas - 26th Anderson - 43rd	This resolution encourages law enforcement to recognize a citizen's bill of rights for police accountability.	Almost all of the points in the resolution are acceptable except mandating that officers have two years of formal education. This could present a recruitment issue.
